HIGHLIGHTS

Proof of Damages

- Clarifying the provisions of Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code Ch. 18 as to affidavits or declarations to prove or contest the cost, necessity, and reasonability of services provided. See Ch. 20, *Damages in Tort*, § 20.02[1].

Requests for Admission

- The Texas Supreme Court has made clear that requests for admission are not intended to be used as demand on a plaintiff or defendant to admit that he or she has no cause of action or ground of defense. See Ch. 96, *Requests for Admissions*, §§ 96.01[2][a], 96.05[2][c].

Texas Citizens Participation Act

- Overhauling Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code Ch. 27 to

narrow its focus as to when the statute applies, and more clearly address how it is to be enforced by trial courts. See Ch. 333, *Libel and Slander*, § 333.42.

This release updates Texas Litigation Guide with recent Texas Supreme Court and court of appeals decisions and federal cases as well as revised tables and index. Many of the significant developments in this release are summarized below.

Pretrial, Trial, and Appellate Practice

Turnover Orders. The turnover statute, Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 31.002(a), has been amended to clarify that justice courts of appropriate jurisdiction have authority under the statute to aid judgment creditors, through injunction or other means, to reach non-exempt property of the judgment debtor. See Ch. 2, *Jurisdic-*

tion of Texas Courts, § 2.01[3][f], and Ch. 132, *Enforcement of Judgments*, § 132.05[2][a].

Advertising for Legal Services. An amendment to Tex. Gov't Code § 81.151 et seq. places new restrictions on televisions advertisements by attorneys soliciting clients or promoting the provision of legal services. See Ch. 3, *Professional Responsibility*, § 3.03[2][e].

Depositions Before Suit. Ch. 10, *Depositions Before Suit*, has been renumbered and updated, and is now located in the Discovery unit, as Ch. 90A, *Depositions Before Suit*.

Attorney's Fees Related to Claims by State Agencies. A Texas statute allows a party to recover attorney's fees from a state agency if the agency's claim against the party is frivolous [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 105.002]; the statute has been amended to limit total recovery to \$1 million dollars. Similar provisions have been enacted to provide for recovery of fees and costs incurred in defending frivolous regulatory actions and contested cases, and these statutes also limit total recovery to \$1 million [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 105.005]. See Ch. 22, *Attorney's Fees*, § 22.26[2].

Multidistrict Litigation. The Government Code has been amended to forbid transfer of certain actions for enforcement of the Deceptive Trade Practices Act or the Medicaid Fraud Prevention Act [Tex. Gov't Code § 74.1625(a)]. See Ch. 64, *Multidistrict Litigation* § 64.02[2][a].

Statutes of Limitation. The statute of limitation has been raised from 15 to 30 years for personal injury claims based on sexual assault or sexual abuse of a child [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 16.0045]. See Ch. 72, *Limitation of Actions*, § 72.02[1][e].

Hospital Lien. The statute creating a lien for hospitals on a cause of action or claim by a person who receives hospital services [Tex. Prop. Code §§ 55.002, 55.005] has been amended to clarify several matters. See Ch. 102, *Settlement*, § 102.05[5], and Ch. 132, *Enforcement of Judgments*, § 132.21[2][a].

Settlement Database. An amendment to the Government Code creates an official database where personal injury or wrongful death settlement agreements for which a minor or incapacitated person is the beneficiary may be recorded [Tex. Gov't Code § 72.034]. See Ch. 102, *Settlement*, § 102.08[1].

Dismissal of Baseless Cause of Action. The statute providing for dismissal of baseless causes of action has been amended so that attorney's fees are now permissive, not mandatory, when a trial court grants or denies a motion to dismiss [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 30.021]. See Ch. 103, *Dismissal*, § 103.02[2].

Dismissal Under Texas Citizens Participation Act. Amendments to the TCPA [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 27.001 et seq.] revise the procedures for dismissal of legal actions based on or in response to a party's exercise of the right of free

speech, right to petition, or right of association. See Ch. 103, *Dismissal*, § 103.04[1][f].

Protection for Jurors. A statute protecting jurors from termination of employment because of their jury service [Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 122.001] has been expanded. See Ch. 120, *Jury Selection*, § 120.01[7].

Discovery. In *Medina v. Zuniga*, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 836, ___ S.W.3d ___, 2019 Tex. LEXIS 387, at *9-*10 (April 26, 2019), the Texas Supreme Court discussed the use of requests for admissions, and made clear that this discovery tool is not intended to be used as demand on a plaintiff or defendant to admit that he or she has no cause of action or ground of defense; the Court concluded that sanctions could not be ordered against a party who failed to admit negligence during discovery but conceded it at trial. See Ch. 96, *Requests for Admissions*, §§ 96.01[2][a], 96.05[2][c].

Business and Commerce

Derivative Proceedings Made Uniform. The Legislature made significant changes in the Texas Business Organizations Code to make uniform the standards and requirements for derivative proceedings involving for-profit corporations, limited liability companies, and limited partnerships. These changes include standing requirements for an equity owner to institute a derivative proceeding for a converted entity, changes to the limitations-tolling provisions, and a defendant-centered ap-

proach to the applicable procedures in a derivative proceedings involving closely-held entities [Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code §§ 21.551 et seq., 101.451 et seq., 153.401 et seq.]. See Ch. 162, *Derivative Proceedings*; Ch. 180, *Limited Liability Companies*, § 183.04[5]; Ch. 182, *Limited Partnership*, § 182.08.

Unconscionable Price for Care at Freestanding Emergency Facilities Made Actionable Under DTPA.

The Legislature added Section 17.464 to Tex. Bus. & Comm. Code to curb unexpected and excessive charges for emergency care services at freestanding emergency facilities. The Act allows the attorney general to bring an action against such a facility when the price for care is at or above 200 percent of what is normally charged for the services by hospital emergency rooms in the nearest county. The Act also leaves open a possible private cause of action against an emergency facility under the DTPA for an unconscionable act or course of action. See Ch. 220, *Deceptive Trade Practices*, § 220.02[4][c], and § 220.08[5].

New Duties to Find, Remove, Report, and Prevent Gas Pump Payment Terminal Skimmers. New Tex. Bus. & Comm. Code § 607.001 et seq. impose on a motor fuel merchant a duty to implement procedures that comport with the attorney general's rules governing unattended payment terminals on fuel dispensers, a duty to immediately report a skimmer when discovered, and a duty to cooperate with an investigation by the

Department of Agriculture and law enforcement agencies. Violations of the provisions carry civil and criminal penalties. See Ch.220A, *Improper Business Practices*, § 220A.18.

Civil Liability Immunity for Disaster-Mitigation Services Initiated by Charitable Organizations.

In an effort to encourage aid to persons in need following man-made or natural disasters, the Legislature added Section 79.003 to Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code to provide civil-liability immunity to any person providing care, assistance, or advice at the request of a charitable organization, and providing immunity to charitable organizations for the acts of any person providing such services at its request. See Ch. 191, *Charitable and Religious Organizations*, § 191.01[5][g].

Family Law

Agreements Incident to Divorce.

In a divorce or annulment, if the court incorporates the parties' agreement incident to divorce by reference in the final decree, the agreement does not have to be filed with the court or the court clerk [Tex. Fam. Code § 7.006(b)]. See Ch. 362, *Divorce*, § 362.30[2][a].

Gestational Agreement. If the parties to a divorce are the intended parents under a gestational agreement that is in effect and that establishes a parent-child relationship between the parties as intended parents and an unborn child on the birth of the child, the petition in the dissolution suit must so state [Tex. Fam. Code

§ 6.406(a-1)]. See Ch. 362, *Divorce*, § 362.100[1][c]; Ch. 380, *Paternity*, § 380.01[3][i].

Transfer of SAPCR. The filing of an adoption suit is grounds for mandatory transfer of proceedings from a court with continuing, exclusive jurisdiction to the adoption court [Tex. Fam. Code § 155.201(a-1)]. See Ch.370, *SAPCR Procedures*, § 370.04[1][h].

Sole Managing Conservator's Rights. A parent or a nonparent appointed as a child's sole managing conservator has the right to apply for a passport for the child, renew the child's passport, and maintain possession of the child's passport [Tex. Fam. Code §§ 153.132, 153.371]. See Ch. 371, *Conservatorship*, § 371.06[1], [2].

Standard Possession Order. Under the standard possession order, a managing conservator may opt to have possession of the child for one weekend during the possessory conservator's extended summer possession period, provided the managing conservator picks up the child from the possessory conservator and returns the child to that same place. New language added to the standard order now requires the possessory conservator to give the managing conservator timely written notice of the location at which the managing conservator is to pick up and return the child [Tex. Fam. Code § 153.312(c)]. See Ch. 371, *Conservatorship*, § 371.09[2][c].

Temporary Authorization for Inpatient Mental Health Services for

Child. New Family Code Chapter 35A allows a child's nonparent relative caregiver to obtain a court order granting him or her temporary authorization to consent to voluntary inpatient mental health services for the child. See Ch. 371, *Conservatorship*, § 371.17.

Support for Adult Disabled Child. When ordering a parent to pay support for an adult disabled child, the court may designate a special needs trust and provide that the support may be paid to the trust for the child's benefit [Tex. Fam. Code § 154.302(c)]. See Ch. 371A, *Child Support*, § 371A.02[2][b].

Personal Injury Litigation

Emergency Medical Treatment. Clarifying that the elevated standard of proof under Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 74.153 for emergency treatment in an obstetrical unit does not apply when the need for emergency care arises after admission, apparently overruling the prior Texas Supreme Court precedent of *Tex. Health Presbyterian Hosp. of Denton v. D.A.*, 569 S.W.3d 126 (Tex. 2018) to the contrary. See Ch. 321, *Medical Malpractice*, § 321.18[2].

TCPA. The stay of the trial court proceedings during an interlocutory appeal under the Texas Citizens Participation Act is mandatory, so the court of appeals may not lift the stay to permit further proceedings in the trial court [In re Geomet Recycling LLC, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 1268 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 333, *Libel and Slander*, § 333.42[8][c].

Privilege. The interlocutory appeal

statute applicable to privilege claims by a media defendant: (1) extends to any and all claims resolved by the order, and is not restricted to the particular claims that implicate privilege concerns [Dall. Symphony Ass'n v. Reyes, 571 S.W.3d 753 (2019)]; and (2) permits more than one appeal, provided it is not a mere motion to reconsider previous grounds [Scripps NP Operating, Ltd. Liab. Co. v. Carter, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 1097 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 333, *Libel and Slander*, § 333.11[4][c].

Search Warrants. A series of newspaper articles about the issuance and execution of search warrants and related civil litigation against a compounding pharmacy was within the third-party allegation privilege because the articles fairly and accurately reported on the accusations, and did not state or imply that the pharmacy was actually guilty of violating the law [Dall. Morning News, Inc. v. Hall, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 983 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 333, *Libel and Slander*, § 333.21[1].

Immunity. When a government unit asserts an affirmative claim seeking to establish title to a mineral interest, the unit does not have immunity as to adverse claims to that same interest, or as to breach of contract of a settlement of the dispute [Hughes v. Tom Green Cty., 573 S.W.3d 212 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 293, *Claims Against Governmental Entities*, § 293.01[1A], [2].

Conspiracy Claims. A claim of a civil conspiracy is a derivative claim that depends on the commission of

some underlying tort, so the same statute of limitations that applies to that tort also applies to a claim of a civil conspiracy to commit it [Agar Corp., Inc. v. Electro Circuits Int'l, LLC, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 716 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 290, *Negligence*, § 290.32[2][b]; Ch. 334, *Conversion*, § 334.100[1][d]; Ch. 336, *Fraud*, § 336.08[2].

Insurance Litigation

Claims Against Architects and Engineers. Amending the certificate of merit provisions of Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code Ch. 150 to apply them to all claims for relief against licensed professionals, effectively overruling the prior Texas Supreme Court precedent of *Jaster v. Comet II Constr., Inc.*, 438 S.W.3d 556 (Tex. 2014), limiting the requirement to claims brought by an original plaintiff. See Ch. 322, *Professional Malpractice*, § 322.04[2][c].

Tort Claims Act. Expanding immunity under Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code Ch. 79 for charities and volunteer health care providers and their employing institutions when giving care, assistance, or advice in relation to a man-made or natural disaster. See Ch. 293, *Claims Against Governmental Entities*, § 293.; Ch. 321, *Medical Malpractice*, § 321.03[4].

Worker's Compensation. Providing that a political subdivision that self-insures does not have sovereign immunity from the imposition of administrative penalties by the Division, or attorney's fees by a court under certain circumstances. See Ch. 340, *Worker's Compensation*,

§§ 340.01[4], 340.33[1].

Auto Policies. Requiring an automobile liability policy to be an “operator’s policy,” i.e., one that covers any vehicle operated by the insured, regardless of ownership, and excludes particular individuals who drive with the insured’s permission only if they are specifically named in the exclusion. In addition, a “loaner” or other vehicle provided by a dealership or other repair facility while the insured’s primary vehicle is in the shop must be covered. See Ch. 341, *Liability Insurance*, § 341.14[2].

Worker's Compensation. The time to file a petition for judicial review of an appeals panel decision is not jurisdictional; instead, it is a claims-processing rule that is waived or forfeited when no one objects that the petition is untimely [Tex. Mut. Ins. Co. v. Chicas, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 709 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 340, *Worker's Compensation*, § 340.30[4][a].

Insurance Code Violations. A property insurer that pays the amount of an appraisal award has fulfilled its policy obligations and cannot be liable for breach of contract; however, payment does not bar claims under the Prompt Payment provisions of the Insurance Code, provided the insurer (1) either accepts liability or is adjudicated liable under the policy, and (2) violated a statutory deadline or requirement [Barbara Techs. Corp. v. State Farm Lloyds, 2019 Tex. LEXIS 687 (Tex. 2019); Ortiz v. State Farm Lloyds, 2019 Tex. LEXIS 678 (Tex. 2019)]. See Ch. 343, *Property Insurance*, §§ 343.07[1], 343.13[1]; Ch.

345, *Unfair Insurance Practices*, §§ 345.30[3], 345.31.

Real Estate Litigation

Termination Due to Family Violence. Clarifying the tenant’s right to terminate a residential lease due to family violence. *See* Ch. 282, *Landlord and Tenant*, § 282.01[4][i].

Lawful Firearms on Premises. Prohibiting a landlord from limiting the lawful possession of firearms or ammunition on or near the leased premises. *See* Ch. 282, *Landlord and Tenant*, § 282.26[14].

Disclosures in Conveyance of Leases. Adopting new Property Code Section 5.152 as to required disclosures in a conveyance of a mineral or royalty interest by an instrument that is presented to the owner by the purchaser, and voiding any instrument that does not comply. *See* Ch. 254, *Deeds and Conveyances*, § 254.11.

Condemnation. The “public use” requirements and other limitations of Government Code Chapter 2206 apply only to takings for economic development purposes, so traditional takings outside the statute are subject only to preexisting common law principles, including judicial deference to any public use determination [KMS Retail Rowlett, LP v. City of Rowlett, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 1038 (Tex. 2019)]. *See* Ch. 261, *Eminent Domain*, §§ 261.13, 261.14[2].

Property Taxes. When property is sold at a tax foreclosure sale, the former owner’s substantial compliance with the redemption statute is

sufficient, even if the full redemption price as computed under the statute is not paid before the redemption deadline [Sorrell v. Estate of Carlton, 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 888 (Tex. 2019)]. *See* Ch. 260, *Real Property Taxes*, § 260.03[7].

Mortgages. When a guarantor waives the specific two-year limitations period for a deficiency judgment, the waiver is not void because the generally applicable four-year statute of limitations for actions on a debt applies [Godoy v. Wells Fargo Bank, N.A., 62 Tex. Sup. Ct. J. 992 (Tex. 2019)]. *See* Ch. 255, *Real Property Security Interests*, § 255.03[6].

Estate Planning

Only Lien Creditor or Secured Creditor May Seek Appointment of Receiver. In *Jay & VMK. Corp. v. Lopez*, 572 S.W.3d 698, 705 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2019, no pet. h.), the court of appeals held that a creditor did not have the right to seek a receiver when he had an equitable subrogation claim, not a lien. *See* Ch. 43, *Receivers*, § 43.100[1][b].

Application of Administrative Procedure Act. This release includes *Mosley v. Tex. HHS Comm’n*, ___ S.W.3d ___, 2019 Tex. LEXIS 427, *13 (Tex. 2019), in which the Texas Supreme Court held that the Administrative Procedure Act applies to all state agencies and processes for judicial review of their decisions, including motions for rehearing. *See* Ch. 422, *Contested Cases*, § 422.01[1].

Sanctions Imposed By Agency.

This release includes *Aleman v. Tex. Med. Bd.*, 573 S.W.3d 796, 807 (Tex. 2019), in which the Texas Supreme Court held that the State Office of Administrative Hearings could not award attorney's fees in a disciplin-

ary proceeding against a licensed physician under Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code Ch. 10 or Tex. R. Civ. P. 13 because it was not a court. See Ch. 422, *Contested Cases*, § 422.01A.
