HIGHLIGHTS

- Chapter 130, *Motions for Judgment* was significantly revised and includes several new forms.
- The Probate Code jurisdiction statutes were rewritten and are effective September 1, 2009.
- The new Estates Code was enacted, but does not take effect until January 1, 2014.

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Pretrial, Trial, and Appellate Practice

Significant legislation enacted that affects pretrial, trial, and appellate practice includes:

Privileges. A new qualified privilege protects journalists from being compelled to disclose their notes and sources. See Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 22.021 et seq.; see § 90.06[3][c], [4][g].

Exempt property. Homestead property may now be transferred to and held by an inter vivos trust and still retain its character as homestead and be exempt from forced sale. See Tex. Prop. Code § 41.0021; see § 132.10[3][a].

Interlocutory appeal. Orders denying arbitration and other types of orders under the Federal Arbitration Act, which formerly could be reviewed only through mandamus, are now subject to interlocutory appeal. See Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 51.016; see § 152.03[1][c][i][G]; see § 153.02[c].

Business Entities and Relationships

Significant legislation enacted that affects business entities and relationships includes:

Evidence of entity's existence. Subject to any qualification stated in the certificate, a certificate issued by the secretary of state

stating that a domestic filing entity or a foreign filing entity is in existence may be relied on as conclusive evidence of the domestic filing entity's existence or as conclusive evidence that the foreign filing entity is registered and authorized to transact business in this state. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 4.005(d), (e); see § 160.21[4][a].

Registered agents. An individual or organization must consent in a written or electronic form, developed by the secretary of state, to serve as an entity's registered agent. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code §§ 5.201, 5.2011; see § 160.21[5][b][i].

Waiver of notice of meeting. Participation or attendance at a meeting by a person entitled to notice of the meeting constitutes a waiver by the person of notice of a particular matter at the meeting that is not included in the purposes or business of the meeting described in the notice, unless the person objects to considering the matter when it is presented. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 6.052(d); see § 160.21[6][b]].

Electronic consent to entity action. Except as otherwise provided by an entity's governing documents, electronic transmission of a consent by an owner, member, or governing person to the taking of an action by the entity is considered a signed writing if the transmission contains or is accompanied by information from which it can be determined (1) that the transmission was transmitted by the owner, member, or governing person, and (2) the date on which the transmission was made. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 6.205; see § 160.21[6][c].

Dissenters rights. A beneficial owner of an ownership interest subject to dissenters' rights held in a voting trust or by a nominee on the beneficial owner's behalf may file a petition when no agreement between the dissenting owner of the ownership interest

and the responsible organization has been reached. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 10.361(g); see § 161.03[4][b].

Termination of right of dissent. On termination of the right of dissent, the dissenting owner and all persons claiming a right under the owner are conclusively presumed to have approved and ratified the action to which the owner dissented and are bound by that action. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 10.367(b); see § 161.06.

Transfer restrictions on shares. When shares are issued for consideration consisting, wholly or partly, of a contract for future services or benefits or for a promissory note, a corporation may place the shares, although fully paid and nonassessable, in escrow, or make other arrangements to restrict the transfer of the shares. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 21.157(c); see § 170.05[1].

Amendment of registration by foreign limited liability companies. A foreign filing entity must amend its registration to reflect a change to its name, a change in the business or activity stated in its application for registration, and, if it is a limited partnership, the admission of a new general partner, the withdrawal of a general partner, and a change in the name of the general partner stated in its application for registration. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 9.009(a); see § 183.02[2][b][i].

Withdrawal of registration by foreign limited liability companies. A foreign filing entity or foreign limited liability partnership that converts to a domestic filing entity is considered to have withdrawn its registration on the effective date of the conversion. See Bus. Orgs. Code § 9.012; see § 183.02[2][b][ii].

Conversion and continuation. A converting entity may elect to continue its existence in its current organizational form

and jurisdiction of formation in connection with the entity's conversion as a domestic entity of one organizational form into a non-United States entity of the same organizational form, or conversion as a non-United States entity of one organizational form into a domestic entity of the same organizational form. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code §10.1025(a); see § 183.11A[3].

Series limited liability company. A company agreement may establish or provide for the establishment of one or more designated series of members, managers, membership interests, or assets, having separate rights, powers, or duties with respect to specified property or obligations of the limited liability company or profits and losses associated with specified property or obligations, or having a separate business purpose or investment objective. See Tex. Bus. Orgs. Code § 101.601 et seq.; see § 183.12.

Commercial Litigation

Significant legislation enacted that affects commercial litigation includes:

Perishable commodities commission merchants. A person that purchases perishable commodities without a license, as owner, agent, or otherwise, does not violate the licensing requirements if the person obtains a license within 30 days after the person first purchases these commodities. See Tex. Agric. Code § 101.003(c); see § 211.02[3].

Claim against produce recovery fund. In making payments from the fund, the Department of Agriculture may pay an aggrieved party the full value of the party's validated claim, except that the total payment of all claims arising from the same contract with a license holder or a person required to be licensed may not exceed \$50,000; payment of a claim filed against a person who is not licensed is limited to 80

percent of the recovery. See Tex. Agric. Code § 103.008; see § 211.03[3].

Veterinarian's lien for services. A licensed veterinarian is entitled to a lien for specified veterinary care charges for large animals. See Tex. Prop. Code § 70.010; see § 212.06[5][a.1][iii].

Holder of possessory lien on motor vehicle. A holder of a possessory lien on a motor vehicle under Property Code Section 70.001, other than a person licensed as a franchised dealer under Chapter 2301 of the Occupations Code, must file a copy of the notice given to the owner and all required information with the county tax assessor-collector's office in the county in which the repairs were made with an administrative fee of \$25, payable to the county tax assessor-collector. See Tex. Prop. Code § 70.006(a); see § 212.06[5][b].

Limiting use of consumer's driver's license number. Printing an individual's driver's license number on a receipt that evidences payment for a sale of goods or services and is provided to the individual is prohibited. A person who violates this prohibition is liable to the state for a civil penalty of up to \$500 for each calendar month in which the violation occurs. See Tex. Bus. & Com. Code §§ 501.1011, 501.102(a-1); see § 220A.10[4].

Using zip code to verify customer's identity. A business may require a customer who purchases goods or services from the business using a credit card to provide his or her zip code to verify his or her identity. The business may not retain the zip code, however, in any form after the purchase of the good or service has been completed. See Tex. Bus. & Com. Code §§ 505.002, 505.003; see § 220A.10[5].

Real Estate Litigation

Significant legislation enacted that af-

facts real estate litigation includes:

Title issues. Amendments to Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 16.034 to mandate an award of attorney’s fees to a prevailing record title holder against a party claiming by adverse possession if the court finds that the adverse possession claim was groundless and made in bad faith. In the absence of such a finding, an award of attorney’s fees against a party claiming by adverse possession remains within the court’s discretion. See §§ 250.08, 250.104[1], §§ 251.05[1], 251.100[1], §§ 280.01[3][d], 280.100[1][b].

Amendments to the statutory provisions governing *lis pendens* [see Tex. Prop. Code §§ 12.007, 12.0071, 12.008] to: (1) require service of a copy of the notice of *lis pendens* on each party to the action who has an interest in the real property no later than three days after it was filed with the court; and (2) provide a procedure for a motion to cancel or expunge the notice of *lis pendens*. If expunction is sought, the party must serve the motion to expunge at least 20 days before any hearing on the motion, and the court must order expunction if: (1) the pleading does not contain a real property claim; (2) the claimant fails to establish by a preponderance of the evidence the probable validity of the real property claim; or (3) the claimant did not timely serve the notice on each party within three days of filing. See §§ 254.07[5][d], 254.100[1][b].

Adoption of Tex. Prop. Code § 51.015 to provide greater substantive and procedural protections to active duty military servicemembers against both judicial and nonjudicial foreclosure of mortgage and deed of trust liens. When the statute is applicable, it precludes any sale, foreclosure, or seizure during the servicemember’s active duty service or for nine months after that service

ends, unless conducted under a prior court order, or the servicemember waived the protections of the statute. See § 255.04[6].

Real property taxes. Expansion of the period in Tex. Tax Code § 42.21 for seeking judicial review of the determination of a tax protest from the prior 45 days to a more generous 60 days. Moreover, this change is procedural only and applies to any action for judicial review pending on the docket on the date of enactment. Accordingly, the expanded 60-day period to seek judicial review applies to any live claim for that review, irrespective of when the underlying tax proceeding was decided, or when judicial review of that proceeding was sought. See §§ 260.04[3][b], 260.51, 260.101[1].

Adoption of Tex. Tax Code § 11.135 to provide that a residence homestead exemption generally continues in effect for two years while a replacement structure for an uninhabitable residence is built. This ensures that a homestead exemption does not lapse due to cataclysmic events such as fire, flood, or wind, even if the owner cannot occupy the property on January 1 of the tax year due to reconstruction efforts. See § 260.01[3][b].

Amendments to Tex. Tax Code § 34.04 relating to a claim for excess proceeds after a tax sale to: (1) limit who may qualify as a “former owner” of the property; (2) regulate any assignment or transfer of a claim to excess proceeds; (3) prohibit any non-attorney from charging a fee to obtain excess proceeds; and (4) limit the amount that may be charged in conjunction with any assignment or transfer, as well as the amount that the court may award under such an assignment or transfer. See §§ 260.03[6][b], 260.105.

Adoption of Tex. Tax Code § 41.415 to require certain larger counties to allow a

property owner with a homestead exemption to file a notice of protest electronically if the basis of the protest is either the property's valuation or its unequal appraisal. See § 260.04[2][a].

Proposed amendments to Tex. Const. art. 8 § 1(j), subject to ratification at November 3, 2009 election, that will authorize legislation to provide for taxation of properties based solely on their use as residence homesteads, regardless of whether that use is considered to be the highest and best use of the property. See § 260.02[1][a].

Condemnation. Proposed amendments to Tex. Const. art. 1 § 17(c), subject to ratification at November 3, 2009 election, that will: (1) more clearly define the "public use" element of eminent domain, including prohibiting condemnation for economic development purposes; and (2) require a two-thirds supermajority of each house of the legislature for future delegations of eminent domain power. See § 261.01[3].

Amendments to Tex. Prop. Code § 21.0112 to require that a landowner's bill of rights statement be provided to the owner immediately when eminent domain authority is invoked, and at least seven days before making a final offer. See § 261.02[1].

Construction contracts. Repeal of Tex. Local Gov't Code § 271.159, which formerly provided that attorney's fees could be recovered in litigation over a construction contract made with a local government entity only if the contract both expressly so provided, and referenced the statute permitting the award of fees. This repeal makes the general authorization for attorney's fees in contract cases found in Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 38.001(8) applicable to disputes with local government units. However, this expanded authorization of attorney's fees applies only to a claim that arises

under a contract executed on or after June 19, 2009. See §§ 270.01[5][b], 270.40[2].

Amendments to the trust fund statutes found in Property Code Chapter 162 to: (1) provide greater protections to trust fund beneficiaries; (2) ensure that the bankruptcy of the trustee does not defeat the trust; and (3) make it clear that the statute applies even to a fully bonded construction project. See § 271.02[7].

Amendments to the McGregor Act [*see* Tex. Gov't Code § 2253.021] to raise the statutory threshold for a payment bond requirement to \$50,000 for prime contracts made by a municipality or a joint airport board created under the Transportation Code. See § 271.03.

Landlord-Tenant. Adoption of Tex. Prop. Code § 92.0161 to create a statutory right to terminate a residential lease entered into on or after January 1, 2010 if certain sex offenses take place on the premises or at any dwelling on the premises, and the tenant is either the victim of the offense, or the parent or guardian of the victim. See § 282.01[4][j].

Amendments to Property Code Chapter 92 to: (1) make it clear that the interruption of utilities of a residential tenant by the landlord is prohibited except in the case of bona fide repairs, construction, or an emergency; and (2) authorize a suit by a residential tenant in justice court to obtain a writ of restoration and other remedies from a landlord who unlawfully interrupts utilities. See §§ 282.23[2], 282.138.

Restrictions. Amendments to Property Code Chapter 209 relating to foreclosure by a homeowner's association that make it clear that redemption rights may be exercised not only by the owner of the property, but also by each lienholder of record, though the lienholder's opportunity to redeem is of course subordinate to the own-

er's. See § 285.06[4].

Personal Injury Litigation.

Significant legislation enacted that affects personal injury litigation includes:

Jurisdiction. Though sellers usually are shielded from product liability to a claimant, the seller may be liable in certain circumstances, including that the manufacturer is not subject to the court's jurisdiction. Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 82.003(c) provides that in all product liability actions pending on or commenced after Sept. 1, 2009, a nonresident manufacturer is presumed to be not subject to the jurisdiction of the court if, after substituted service through the Secretary of State, the manufacturer fails to answer or otherwise make an appearance in the time required by law. This presumption is conclusive unless the seller is able to secure personal jurisdiction over the manufacturer in the action. See § 320.02[2][a].

Certificate of Merit. Amendments to Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 150.002 to make it clear that the certificate of merit requirement in actions against an architect, engineer, or other licensed or registered professional applies to all claims arising from the provision of professional services, whether based in negligence or some other theory of recovery. This amendment reversed the prior understanding of the statute that the requirement applied only in negligence actions. See §§ 322.04[2][d], 322.102[1].

Negligent Hiring of Employees. Amendments to Chapter 145 of the Civil Practices and Remedies Code relating to liability of an in-home service company or residential delivery company for negligent hiring of employees whose duties will include entry into residences. The amendment provide that if the company conducts its own criminal background investigation

and finds the individual free of conviction or deferred adjudication of specified offenses for specified periods, there is a rebuttable presumption of the absence of negligence in hiring the individual in any action alleging a criminal act or omission of the employee brought by a person whose home the employee entered. See § 290.32[1][b][ii][B].

Graffiti. Additions to the Local Government Code that authorize a county or municipality to remove graffiti from property within the jurisdiction after notice, together with the corresponding adoption of Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 101.067 to provide that the Texas Tort Claims Act does not apply to a claim for property damage caused by the removal of graffiti. See § 293.12[18].

Seat Belts. Expansion of the seat belt law to apply to all adults including those riding in the back seat, and the child safety restraint laws to require securing children 7 years of age or younger. See § 300.03[2].

Emergencies. Adoption of Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 75.006(b) to provide that when emergency responders such as firefighters or peace officers find it necessary to cut or otherwise remove fences in order to adequately address the emergency, the landowner is not liable for any damages caused by the owner's livestock, regardless of whether the damage occurs on the landowner's property. See §§ 300.02[4], 300.140[1], 300.141[1], § 310.08.

Wrongful Imprisonment. Amendments to the Wrongful Imprisonment Act, Tex. Civ. Prac. & Rem. Code § 103.001 et seq., that both expand the relief available to wrongfully imprisoned persons, but also eliminate the option to sue for that relief, instead requiring the presentation of an administrative claim. See § 331.08[3].

Review of a Worker's Compensation

Administrative Claim. Amendments to Tex. Lab. Code § 410.252(a) to expand the time to file a suit for judicial review of a worker's compensation administrative claim. The prior 40-day period was replaced by a requirement that suit be filed not later than the 45th day after the mailing date of the decision. Moreover, the statute also provides that the mailing date is considered to be the fifth day after the date the decision was filed. The statute therefore effectively provides that a suit for judicial review must be filed within 50 days of the date the decision is filed. See §§ 340.30[4], [5], 340.150[1][b], 340.151[1].

Utilization Review Process. Amendments to the Insurance Code to expand the utilization review process used to determine medical necessity under health insurance and worker's compensation policies to include not only prospective or concurrent review, but also to include retrospective review after services are complete, as well as to determine the experimental or investigational nature of health care services. This expanded definition is applicable only to a policy delivered, issued for delivery, or renewed on or after January 1, 2010. See § 340.11[1], § 344.02[4][f].

Continuation of Group Health Coverage. Amendments to Chapter 1251 of the Insurance Code relating to continuation of group health coverage for employees, members, and their eligible dependents to harmonize state law with recent amendments to the federal COBRA Act. See § 344.01[2][f].

Interpleader Exception. Adoption of Tex. Ins. Code § 542.058(c) to recognize an interpleader exception to the prompt payment of claims requirements. The exception applies only to a life insurer that receives notice of an adverse, bona fide claim to all or part of the policy proceeds

before the payment deadline, and either pays the claim or files an interpleader action within 90 days. See § 344.05[1], § 345.31.

Burial Benefits under Worker's Compensation. Amendment of Tex. Lab. Code § 408.182 to eliminate the requirement, for an injury that occurs on or after Sept. 1, 2009, that a surviving parent be eligible for burial benefits in order to obtain death benefits under the worker's compensation laws. See § 340.12[1].

Family Code Litigation

Significant legislation enacted that affects family code litigation includes:

Divorce. The usual 60-day waiting period for a divorce decree does not apply if the respondent has been convicted of a family violence offense or if the petitioner has a family violence protective order against the respondent. See § 362.10.

Division of Property. The statutes covering economic contribution and reimbursement have been substantially revised. The former system of economic contribution is now a system of reimbursement and offset based on equitable principles. See § 363.55.

Parenting Facilitators. New Family Code Section 153.6051 et seq. provide for the appointment of a social worker, counselor, marriage and family therapist, psychologist, or attorney to serve as a parenting facilitator in a high-conflict SAPCR to assist parties in resolving parenting issues through nonconfidential procedures. See §§ 370A.03, 370A.120, 370A.121.

Temporary Orders for Parent Away on Military Duty. New Family Code Section 153.701 et seq. provide for temporary custody and child support orders to be rendered if either parent is ordered to a military deployment, military mobilization,

or temporary military duty at a distant location. These new statutes replace the 2007 provisions for SAPCR orders in the event of a possessory conservator's military deployment. See §§ 371.10, 371.80 371.81.

Agreed Parenting Plan. Parents who enter into a written agreement for joint managing conservatorship now have the option of agreeing that the child's primary residence will be within a specified geographic area, rather than designating the conservator who has the exclusive right to designate the child's primary residence. See § 371.03[4][b].

Standard Possession Order. The standard possession order has been amended to clarify that all pick-up and drop-off times are at 6:00 p.m. unless the possessory conservator has elected an alternative time. Section 153.317, covering elections of alternative pick-up and drop-off times, has been expanded to treat each category of visitation separately to clarify when elections are available. See § 371.04[2][b].

Grandparent Access. A grandparent's petition for possession of or access to a grandchild must now include an affidavit with facts to support the allegation that denial of grandparent possession or access would significantly impair the child's physical health or emotional well-being. See § 371.06.

Disabled Child Support Obligor. Under new Section 157.009, a child support obligor is entitled to a credit against arrearages if the child receives a lump-sum payment as a result of the obligor's disability. See § 372.04[2][a].

Child Support Lien. New Family Code Section 157.3171 sets out the procedure for releasing a child support lien that has attached to homestead real property. See § 372.06[9].

Termination of Parental Rights. Parental rights may now be terminated if the parent has been convicted of criminal attempt or criminal solicitation to murder the child's other parent. See § 381.03[2][b][xix].

Probate Code Litigation

Significant legislation enacted that affects probate code litigation includes:

Anatomical gifts. Anatomical gifts are now governed by the Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act. See Tex. Health & Safety Code §§ 692A.001-692A.023; see § 390.01[1].

Original probate jurisdiction. All probate proceedings must be filed and heard in a court that exercises original probate jurisdiction; such a court also has jurisdiction of all matters relating to the probate proceeding, as specified for the particular type of court. See Tex. Prob. Code § 4A(a); see § 392.02[1][b][i].

Jurisdiction of contested probate proceedings in counties having no statutory probate or county court. In a county in which there is no statutory probate court or county court at law exercising original probate jurisdiction, when a matter in a probate proceeding is contested, the judge of the county court may, on the judge's own motion, or must on the motion of any party to the proceeding, either request the assignment of a statutory probate court judge to hear the contested matter or transfer the contested matter to the district court, which may then hear the contested matter as if it had been originally filed in the district court. See Tex. Prob. Code § 4D(a). See § 392.02[1][b][ii].

Jurisdiction of contested probate proceedings in counties having no statutory probate court. In a county in which there is no statutory probate court, but in which

there is a county court at law exercising original probate jurisdiction, when a matter in a probate proceeding is contested, the judge of the county court may, on the judge's own motion, or must on the motion of any party to the proceeding, transfer the contested matter to the county court at law; the judge of the county court may also transfer the entire proceeding to the county court at law, on the judge's own motion or on a party's motion. See Tex. Prob. Code § 4E(a). See § 392.02[1][b][iii].

Exclusive jurisdiction of probate proceeding in counties having statutory probate court. In a county in which there is a statutory probate court, that court has exclusive jurisdiction of all probate proceedings, whether contested or uncontested; a cause of action related to the probate proceeding must be brought in a statutory probate court unless that court's jurisdiction is concurrent with the jurisdiction of a district court or with the jurisdiction of any other court. See Tex. Prob. Code § 4F(a). See § 392.02[1][b][iv].

No-contest provision in will. A provision in a will that would cause a forfeiture of a devise or void a devise or provision in favor of a person for bringing any court action, including a will contest, is unenforceable if there is probable cause for bringing the action and the action was brought and maintained in good faith. See Tex. Prob. Code § 64. See § 392.08[1].

Criminal history record information for proposed guardian. The court clerk is not required to obtain criminal history record information for a private professional guardian or public guardian who holds a certificate issued under Government Code Section 111.042, or a provisional certificate issued under Government Code Section 111.0421, when the Guardianship Certification Board has conducted a

criminal history check on the person before issuing or renewing the certificate; at the court's request, the board must provide to the clerk the criminal history record information that was obtained from the Department of Public Safety or the FBI. See Tex. Prob. Code § 698(a-6); see § 410.03[7].

Transfer of property in management trust to subaccount of pooled trust. If the court determines that it is in the best interests of the ward or incapacitated person who is subject to a guardianship, the court may order the transfer of all property in the ward's or incapacitated person's management trust to a subaccount of a pooled trust. See Tex. Prob. Code § 868C; see § 411.03[9].

Removal of guardian. The court may, on the complaint of the Guardianship Certification Board, remove a guardian who would be ineligible for appointment because of the guardian's failure to maintain the certification required by Probate Code Section 697B. See Tex. Prob. Code § 761(c-1); see § 411.05[5][d].

Guardian's compensation. A court that has authorized payment of estimated quarterly compensation to the guardian may later reduce or eliminate the guardian's compensation if, on review of an annual or final accounting or otherwise, the court finds that the guardian received compensation in excess of the amount permitted by statute, has not adequately performed the duties required of a guardian, or has been removed for cause. See Tex. Prob. Code § 665(d); see § 411.07[1].

Modification of guardian's compensation. On application of an interested person or on its own motion, the court may review and modify the amount of the guardian's compensation if the court finds that the amount is unreasonably low when considering the services rendered as guardian, and

may authorize compensation for the guardian in an estimated amount that the court finds reasonable. See Tex. Prob. Code § 665(c); see § 411.07[2].

Award of attorney's fees in guardianship proceeding. A court that creates a guardianship or a management trust for a ward, on request of a person who filed an application to be appointed guardian of the proposed ward, an application for the appointment of another suitable person as guardian, or an application for the creation of the management trust, may authorize the payment of reasonable and necessary attorney's fees, as determined by the court, to an attorney who represents the person who filed the application at the application hearing, regardless of whether the person is appointed the ward's guardian or whether a management trust is created. See Tex. Prob. Code § 665B(a); see § 411.07[3].

Required notice to patient. At the time a patient is admitted to an inpatient mental health facility for voluntary or involuntary inpatient mental health services, the facility

must provide to the patient, and to the parent of a patient who is a minor or the guardian of the person of the patient, written notice that a trust under Health and Safety Code Section 552.018 is not liable for the patient's support. See Tex. Health & Safety Code § 576.010(a); see § 415.01[3][b].

Transportation plan for discharged patient. The administrator of a mental health facility, in conjunction with the local mental health authority, must create a transportation plan for a person who is scheduled to be furloughed or discharged from the facility.
